Amnesty Group


Students at Marling School had the rare opportunity to pose questions to their local MP, Siobhan Baillie and they were rewarded with an unexpected scoop: in questioning her, they discovered that she is backing Rishi Sunak to be the next prime Minister of the UK, after the resignation of Liz Truss earlier in the week. Ms Baillie, who is coming to the end of her recent maternity leave, also brought her daughter along to the Question and Answer session at the school. She answered at length, questions about Ukrainian refugees and whether Britain was doing enough; she spoke about the cost of living crisis and austerity and about her campaign against online abuse. Ms Baillie, who was invited by the school's active Amnesty group, commended the pupils, which included A Level Politics students, for their well thought-out questions.

Marling Sixth Form Leavers 2022

This map shows the wide range of courses and destinations our sixth formers go on to do after their A Level studies with us. 81.2% for their first choice and 4.84% got their insurance choice. A total of 83.76% of our students went onto university. The others took up a range of apprenticeships and employment roles and some took a gap year to work, travel or gain valuable work experience in preparation for their university courses.

DESIGN TECHNOLOGY TEXTILES

The DT department have recently taken delivery of a CAD/CAM Embroidery Machine to continue the textiles work we are integrating into the school, alongside more sewing machines.

This CAD/CAM machine enables students to design their own creations and using specialist software, they will be able to embroider them onto their textiles work.

The machine will also be used at A Level to support work on marketing and branding and will form part of the extracurricular offering in the Summer Term.





To add to this, we have also taken delivery of a set of clothing LED's, small portable battery packs and conducting thread. This will enable us to integrate wearable technology into our work, using skills learnt in both DT and Computer Science to develop programs for smart, interactive clothing. On top of all of this, we have also received a new sublimination printer which will allow us to print work to transfer directly onto textiles work and onto other Design Technology projects. Textiles at Marling is slowly coming together!

Biologists Attend Oxford Gene Technology Workshop









Shepton Mallet Prison Trip

Year 13 Sociology & Psychology students visited Shepton Mallet Prison to complements the topics of Crime & Deviance in Sociology and Forensic Psychology in Psychology. They experienced what it is like to be a prisoner and a cell break out.

Y13 Psychology and Sociology students visited Shepton Mallet Prison this term. They were given the full prisoner experience with a prison guard who gave them prisoner suits to wear for the day! To begin, they were asked to create groups and identify their 'gang' name and crime for their punishment in preparation for their cell escape. During this cell escape, they had to work out an extremely difficult puzzle in a real-life prison cell. They thoroughly enjoyed it. One quote from a student 'those cells are so small, I cannot believe what prisoners had to endure'. We then were split into 2 groups for a psychology/sociology haunted tour. Both tour guides took the pupils around the prison where they experienced a prison cell from

the prison where they experienced a prison cell from 1600s, the most haunted gatekeeper room in the building, and how prisoners spent their small amount of free time in the yard. The students were very enthusiastic and dived into the world of prisons!





Year 13 Students had a Particle-ary Fantastic Time Visiting CERN










Dissection Club

The club was designed to enrich the learning of pupils who are interested in biology, exploring the structure of organs, want to practise using clinical equipment and develop their observational skills.




