Artificial Intelligence and The Academic Landscape

During a recent PSHE talk our Year 12 and 13 students delved into the impact of Artificial Intelligence (AI) on their academic landscape. Focusing on the critical issues of plagiarism, bias, and misinformation, the session aimed to highlight the ways in which AI intersects with education. As our students navigate a digital world where information is readily accessible, understanding the implications of AI in plagiarism becomes crucial for maintaining academic integrity. This gave students food for thought both for NEA subjects and as our students make their next steps towards university. Furthermore, the session discussed the role of AI misinformation and bias that exists in many AI tools, urging students to cultivate digital literacy skills. We hope that students critically engage with evolving technologies through their academic studies and beyond and feel confident to use them sensibly and maturely as they navigate the complexities of the information age.

What is STEM Untapped?



Sixth Formers Travel to Spain







Away Match Report







Dissection Club



Simon Atkins from University of Bristol met with prospective medical students to talk about how to apply to medical school and provided some useful advice.




Thanks to Dr Bhargava for coming in to do face-to-face mock interviews & provide feedback for Year 13 students in preparation for their medicine university interviews.

My role as the Youth Representative for Gloucestershire is to engage more young people into nature and to help develop their knowledge about birds and how they interact with the natural environment. My aim for next year is to work with the Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust, our Regional Representative Gordon Kirk and Oliver Norris - a keen birder and nature enthusiast to host at least an event or two in Gloucestershire in which young people who are interested can get involved. Furthermore, looking ahead, I am aiming to do a few talks and to run a few events in some primary schools to increase the interest and engagement from a young age.


